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
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
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Front Cover: Traffic on Interstate 25 roars past the remains of St. Aloysius Catholic Church at the site of the former Colorado coal town of Morley on Raton Pass. St. Aloysius Church was completed in 1917 and consecrated the following June. The Colorado Fuel and Iron Company mine at Morley operated from 1907 to 1956, supporting a community of about six hundred residents and one hundred homes.

Back Cover: Although coal mining has almost ceased in Las Animas County, Colorado, many coal seams remain, as here beside Highway 12 in the Purgatoire River Valley just west of Valdez. Future development of southern Colorado coal may be more through drilling than mining, as these coal beds contain great quantities of high-grade methane gas. Three gas companies are currently working large leases in the field.
