Digital capabilities are changing our options for seeing and listening to works of interest. Some items are available only on the internet; for these I have included the URL. Also, some printed works in the bibliography are available for viewing on the internet; I haven't included URLs for these, but I suggest that you check the internet for their availability. In addition, self-published books are increasing in numbers as these printing services become more available. This year, podcasts are included in the bibliography for the first time; though they have already been broadcast, they are now available to hear on their internet sites.
